## What are the COVID-19 safety requirements for in-person Retreats?

#### In North America, All Retreat attendees must provide:

- Proof of full COVID-19 vaccination, meaning at least 2 weeks has elapsed since your second Moderna or Pfizer dose, or single dose Johnson & Johnson vaccine. A photo of your white CDC card will be required to register for the Retreat.
- A negative antigen/viral test result for Sars-CoV-2 within 96 hours of the Retreat start time.

#### In Moishe House Global Communities? All Retreat attendees must provide either:

- Proof of full COVID-19 vaccination, meaning at least 2 weeks has elapsed since your second dose of an approved vaccine in the country that the Retreat is taking place.
- A negative antigen/viral test result for Sars-CoV-2 within 96 hours of the Retreat start time.

# Per <u>CDC guidance updated on July 27, 2021</u>, the following safety precautions will be in place during in-Person Retreats:

- · Masks required in indoor settings
- Outdoor programming whenever possible
- · Maintaining physical distance from other Retreat groups
- · Single-occupancy rooming on Overnight Retreats
- · Self-screening for COVID-19 symptoms
- · Compliance with venue-specific health and safety protocols
